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Executive Summary

The University of New Hampshire Survey Center included five questions on its August 2022 Granite State Poll for the Community Health Institute about climate change, local communities, and personal stress levels. Nine hundred and ninety-four (994) Granite State Panel members completed the survey online between August 25 and August 29, 2022. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 3.1 percent.

The following figures display survey results, detailed tabular results may be found in Appendix A and Appendix B contains the survey instrument. Due to rounding, percentages may not add to 100%.

Key Findings

Perceptions of Climate Change

A slim majority of New Hampshire residents think that extreme weather events have become more frequent over the past twenty years, particularly Democrats and those who have completed postgraduate work, while one-third think extreme weather events have stayed about the same in that time. The overwhelming majority of residents believe that climate change is happening, but more than a quarter think it is caused mainly by natural forces while more than half think it is caused mainly by human activities. Nearly all Democrats believe climate change is happening and caused mainly by human activities but few Republicans feel that way.

Half of New Hampshire residents say that climate change is extremely or very important to them personally, while one-third say it is not too important or not at all important to them. Democrats, those with the highest and lowest incomes, and those aged 65 and older are particularly likely to say climate change is extremely or very important to them, but few Republicans or Independents say the same.

Perceptions of Community

Just under one-third of New Hampshire residents think it is mostly true that their community treats all people fairly and that people in their community help each other and work together to improve the community. Fewer people think it is mostly true that people in their community have hope about the future or a sense of connection to each other. A plurality say that each of these statements is somewhat true. Those with the lowest incomes and older people tend to be more likely to say these statements are mostly true.

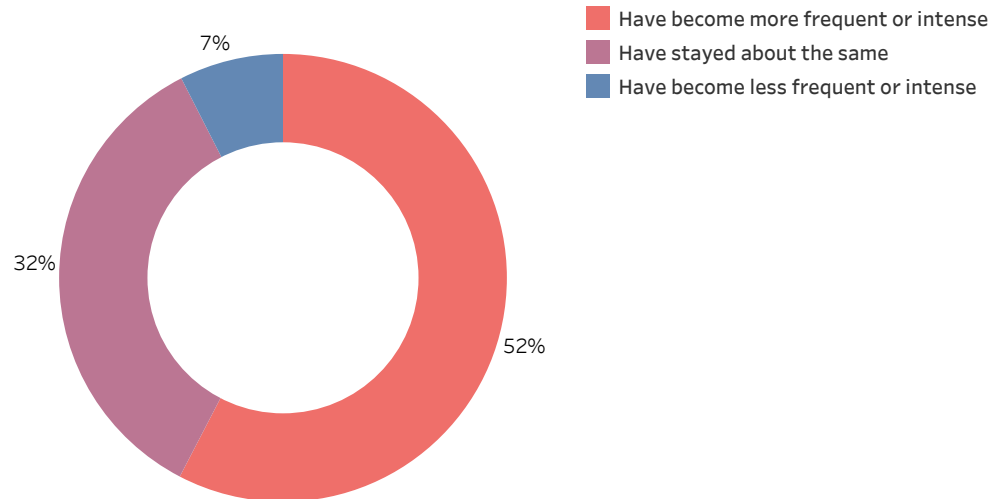
Stress Level

Three in eight Granite Staters say that in the past week they experienced high levels of stress (7-10 on a 0-10 scale), particularly those under the age of fifty, women, Democrats, and those with children in their household. Republicans, Fox News viewers, conservative radio listeners, and men report lower levels of stress in the past week.

Perceptions of Climate Change

Just over half (52%) of New Hampshire residents believe that extreme weather events such as severe storms, flooding, and droughts have become more frequent or intense in New Hampshire over the past twenty years. One-third (32%) believe that extreme weather events have stayed about the same over that time while 7% believe they have become less frequent or intense.

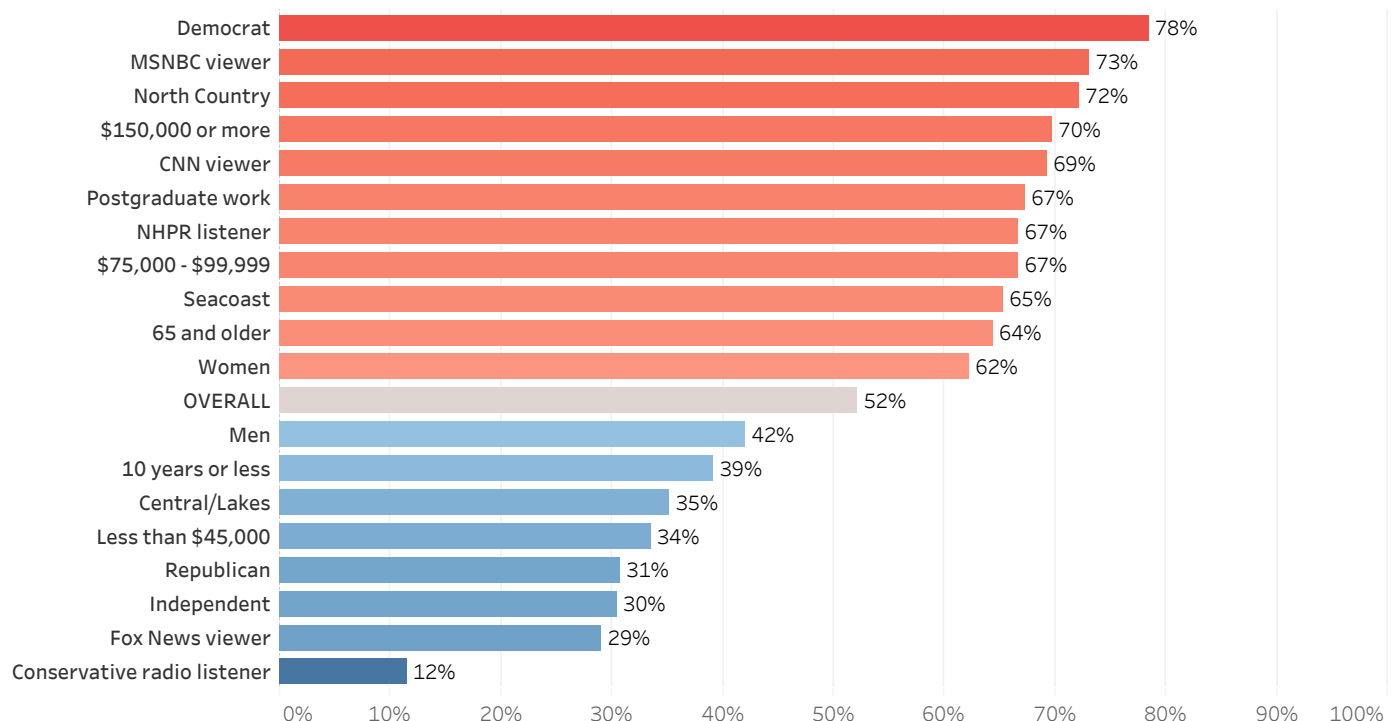
Figure 1a: Over the past 20 years in New Hampshire, extreme weather events such as severe storms, flooding or droughts...



Self-identified Democrats, MSNBC and CNN viewers, North Country and Seacoast residents, those with a household income of \$150,000 or more or between \$75,000 and \$99,999, those who have completed postgraduate work, NHPR listeners, those aged 65 and older, and women are more likely than others to believe that extreme weather events have become more frequent or intense in New Hampshire over the past twenty years. Conservative radio listeners, Fox News viewers, self-identified Independents and Republicans, those with a household income below \$45,000, Central/Lakes Region residents, those who have lived in New Hampshire for ten years or less, and men are less likely to believe that this is the case.

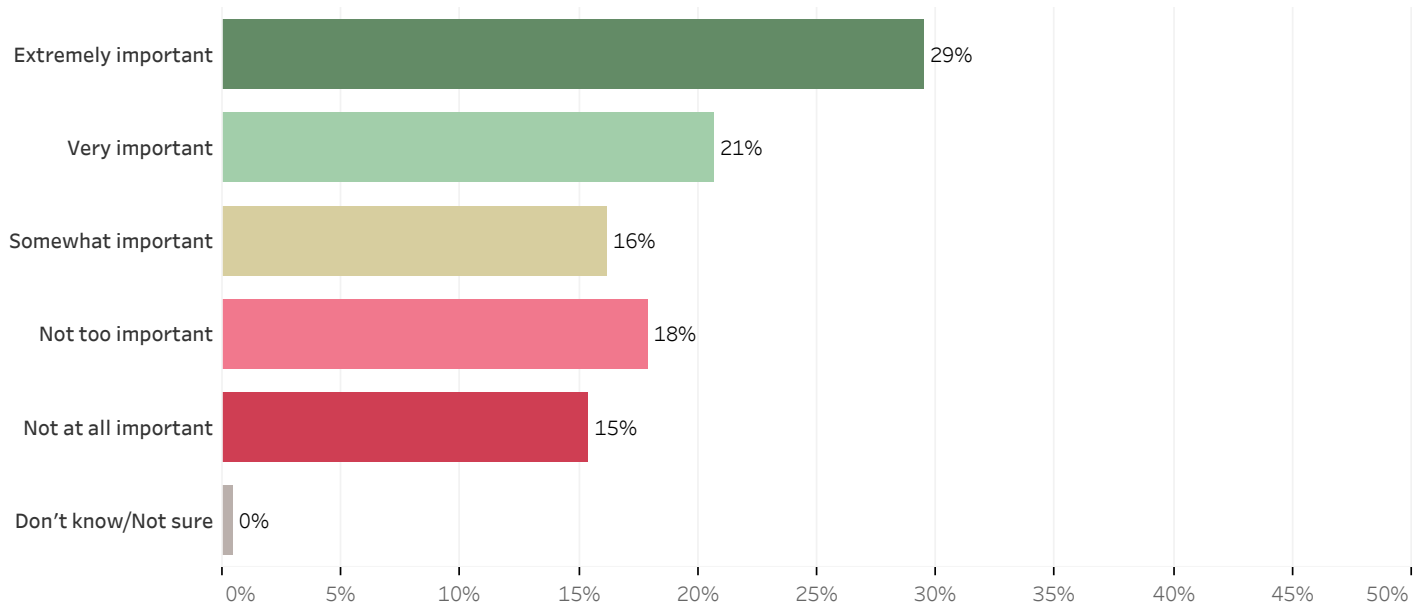
Figure 1b: Perceived change in extreme weather events in NH over the past 20 years - By Demographics

Have become more frequent or intense



Twenty-nine percent of New Hampshire residents say that climate change is extremely important to them personally, 21% say it is very important to them, 16% say it is somewhat important to them, 18% say it is not too important to them, 15% say it is not at all important to them, and less than 1% don't know or are unsure.

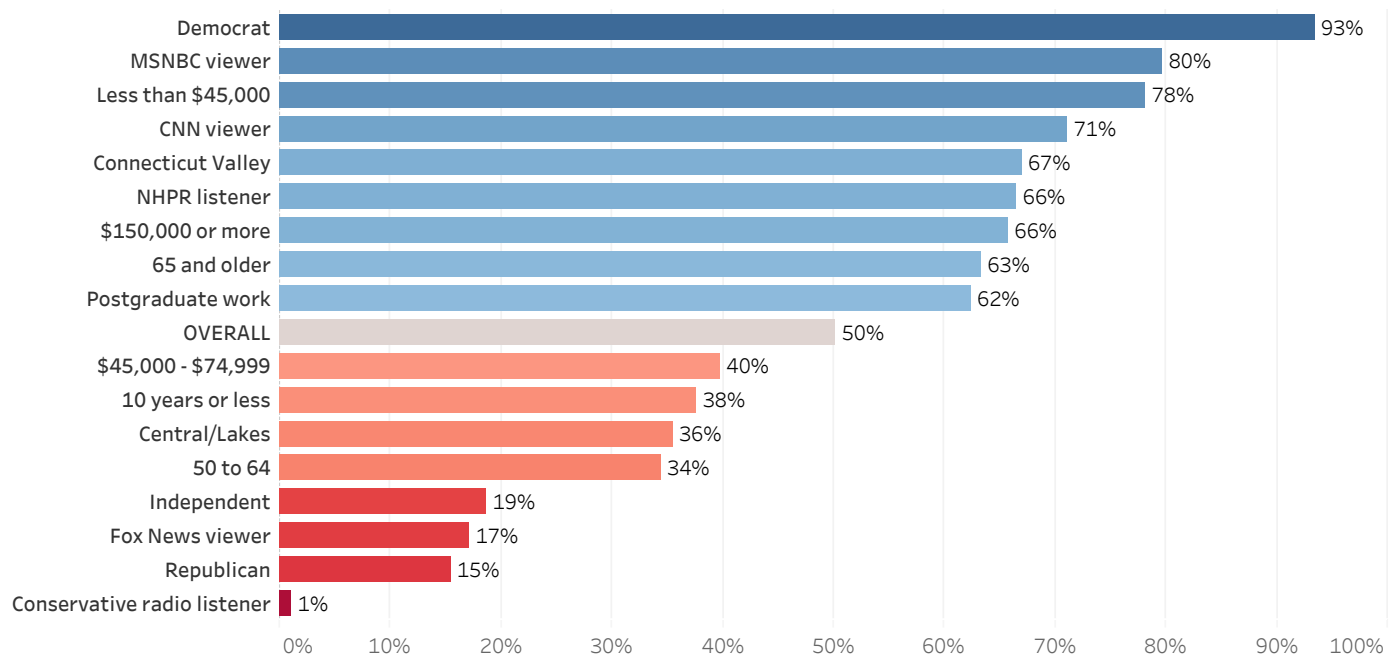
Figure 2a: How important is the issue of climate change to you personally compared to other social or environmental issues?



Self-identified Democrats, MSNBC and CNN viewers, those with a household income below \$45,000 or of \$150,000 or more, Connecticut Valley residents, NHPR listeners, those aged 65 and older, and those who have completed postgraduate work are more likely than others to say that climate change is extremely or very important to them personally. Conservative radio listeners, self-identified Republicans, Fox News viewers, self-identified Independents, those aged 50 to 64, Central/Lakes Region residents, those who have lived in New Hampshire for ten years or less, and those with a household income between \$45,000 and \$74,999 are less likely to say it is extremely or very important to them.

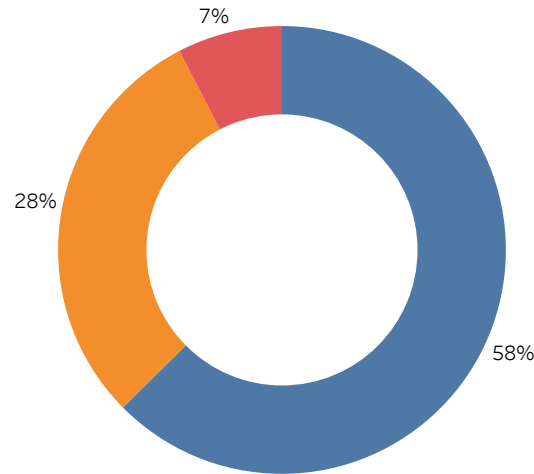
Figure 2b: Importance of climate change to you personally - By Demographics

Fifty-eight percent of New Hampshire residents believe that climate change is happening now, caused mainly by human activities, 28% believe that climate change is happening now, but caused mainly by natural forces, and 7% believe climate change is not happening now.

Figure 3a: Which of the following three statements do you think is more accurate?

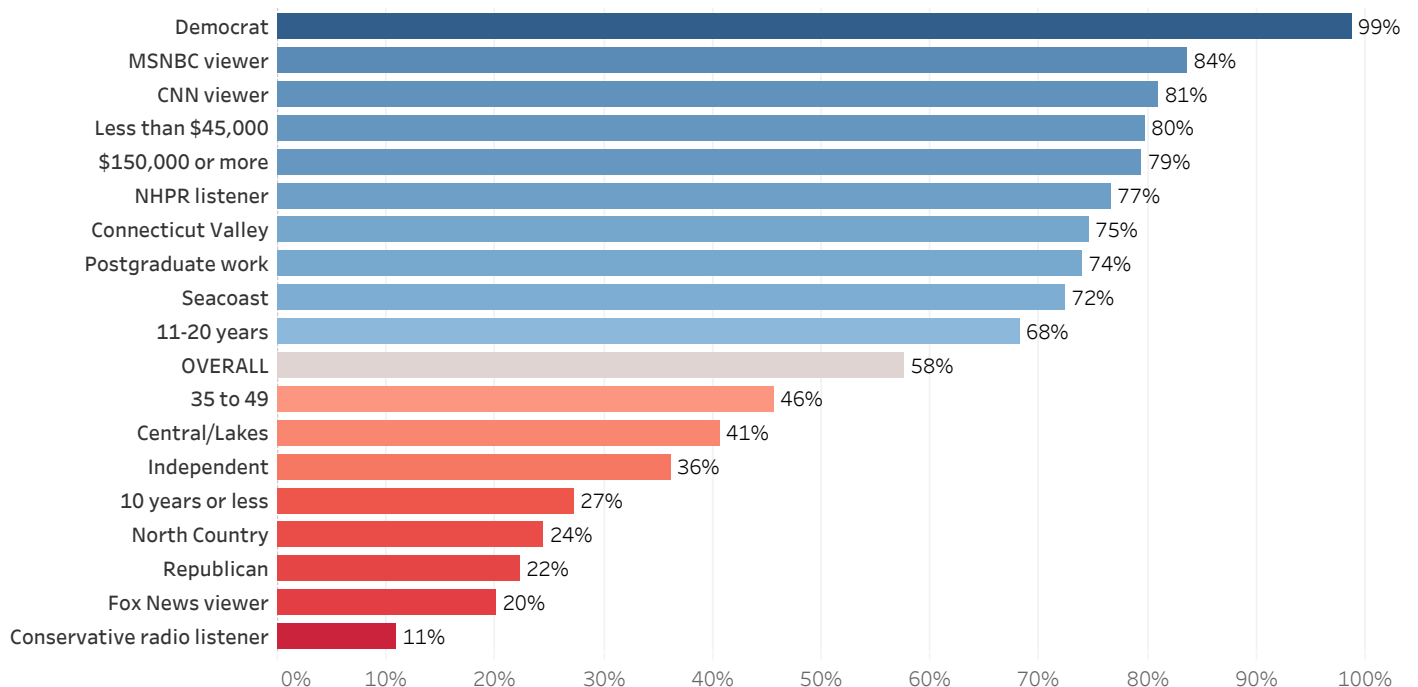


- Climate change is happening now, caused mainly by human activities.

Self-identified Democrats, MSNBC and CNN viewers, those with a household income below \$45,000 or of \$150,000 or more, NHPR listeners, Connecticut Valley and Seacoast residents, those who have completed postgraduate work, and those who have lived in New Hampshire for 11-20 years are more likely than others to believe that climate change is happening now, caused mainly by human activities. Conservative radio listeners, Fox News viewers, self-identified Republicans and Independents, North Country and Central/Lakes Region residents, those who have lived in New Hampshire for ten years or less, and those aged 35 to 49 are less likely to say that climate change is happening now, caused mainly by human activities.

Figure 3b: Which of following statements is more accurate - By Demographics

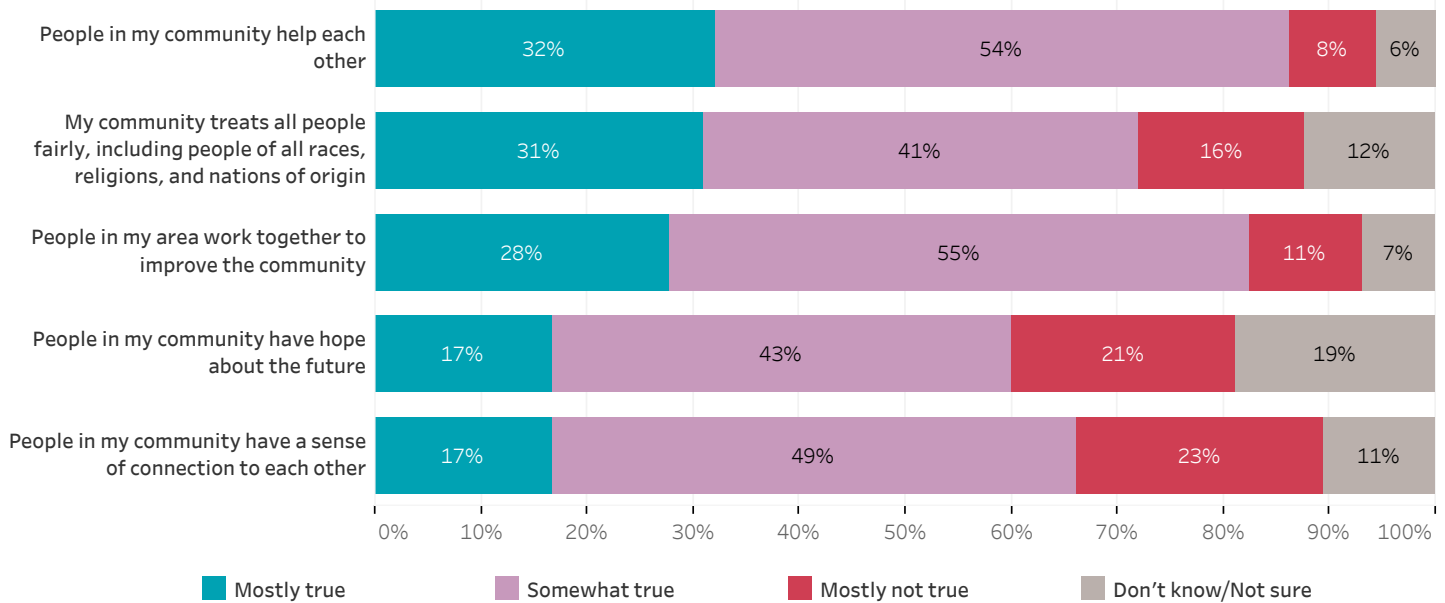
Climate change is happening now, caused mainly by human activities.



Perceptions of Community

Just under one-third of New Hampshire residents say it is mostly true that people in their community help each other (32%), that their community treats all people fairly, including people of all races, religions, and nations of origin (31%), and that people in their area work together to improve the community (28%). Less than one-fifth think it is mostly true that people in their community have hope about the future (17%) or that people in their community have a sense of connection to each other (17%). Pluralities say that these statements are somewhat true, but just over one-fifth say that it is mostly not true that people in the community have hope for the future (21%) or have a sense of connection with each other (23%).

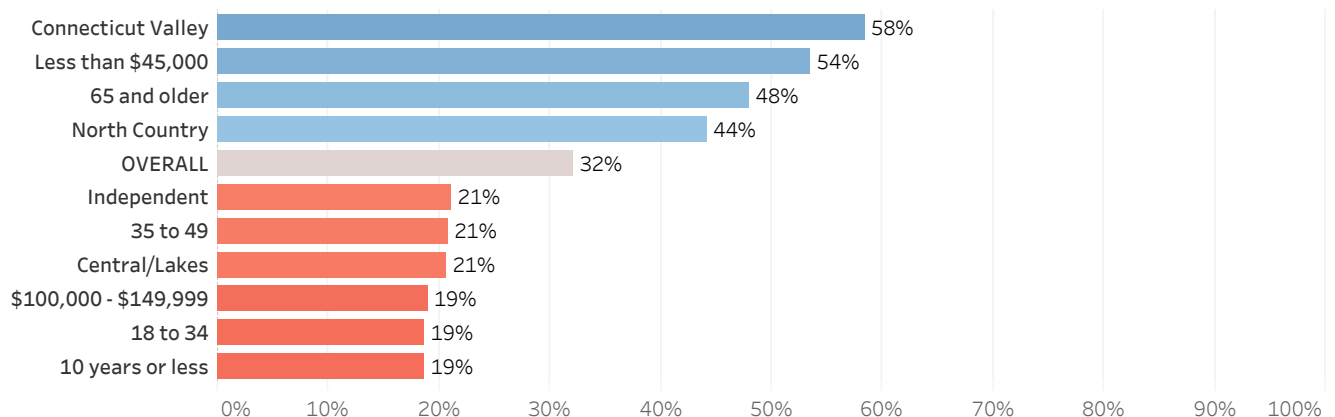
Figure 4a: How true are each of the following statements for describing the town or community where you live?



Connecticut Valley and North Country residents, those with a household income below \$45,000, and those aged 65 and older are more likely than others to say it is mostly true that people in their community help each other. Those who have lived in New Hampshire for ten years or less, those aged 18 to 49, those with a household income between \$100,000 and \$149,999, Central/Lakes Region residents, and self-identified Independents are less likely to say this.

Figure 4b: Believe to be mostly true about their community - By Demographics

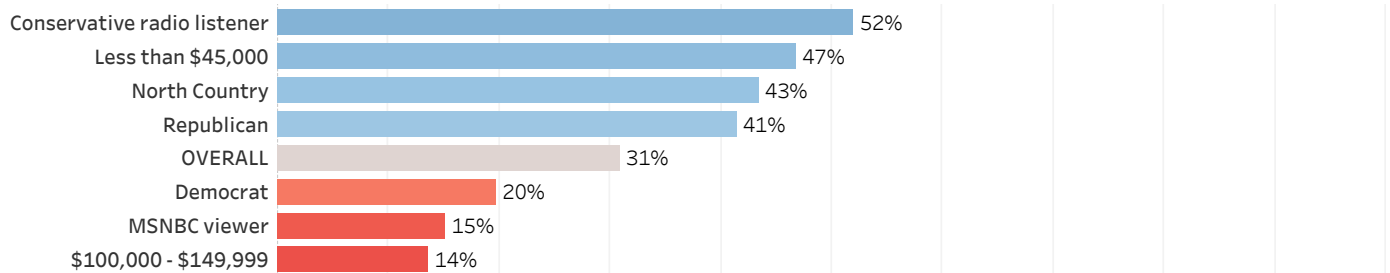

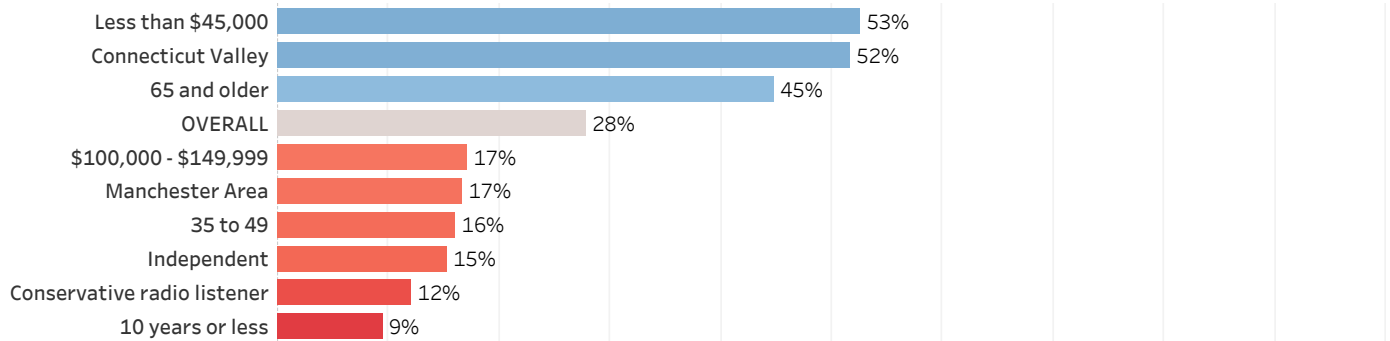
- Conservative radio listeners, those with a household income below \$45,000, North Country residents, and self-identified Republicans are more likely than others to say it is mostly true that their community treats all people fairly, including people of all races, religions, and nations of origin. Those with a household income between \$100,000 and \$149,999, MSNBC viewers, and self-identified Democrats are less likely to say this.
- Respondents with a household income below \$45,000, Connecticut Valley residents, and those aged 65 and older are more likely than others to say it is mostly true that people in their area work together to improve the community. Those who have lived in New Hampshire for ten years or less, conservative radio listeners, self-identified Independents, those aged 35 to 49, Manchester Area residents, and those with a household income between \$100,000 and \$149,999 are less likely to say this.
- Respondents with a household income below \$45,000, Connecticut Valley residents, those who have lived in New Hampshire for 11-20 years, and those aged 65 and older are more likely than others to say it is mostly true that people in their community have hope for the future. Manchester Area residents and those who have lived in New Hampshire for ten years or less are less likely to say this.

Figure 4c: Believe to be mostly true about their community - By Demographics

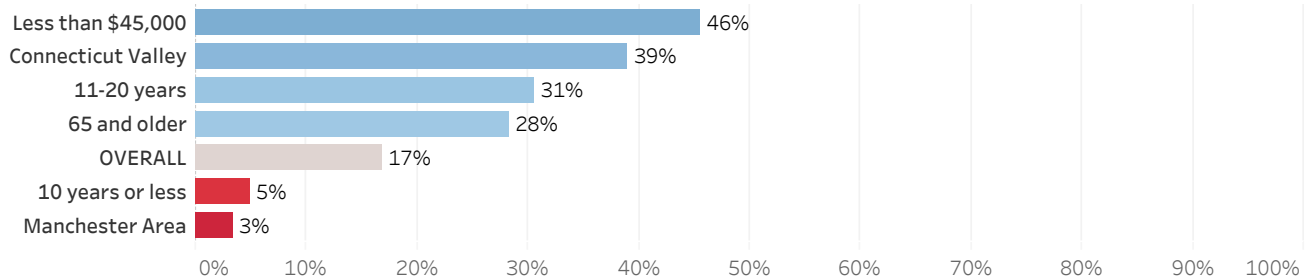

People in my area work together to improve the community



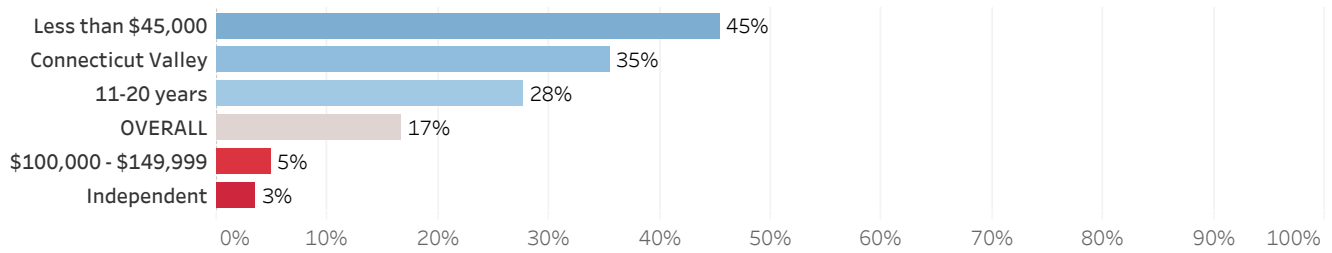
People in my community have hope about the future

Figure 4d: Believe to be mostly true about their community - By Demographics

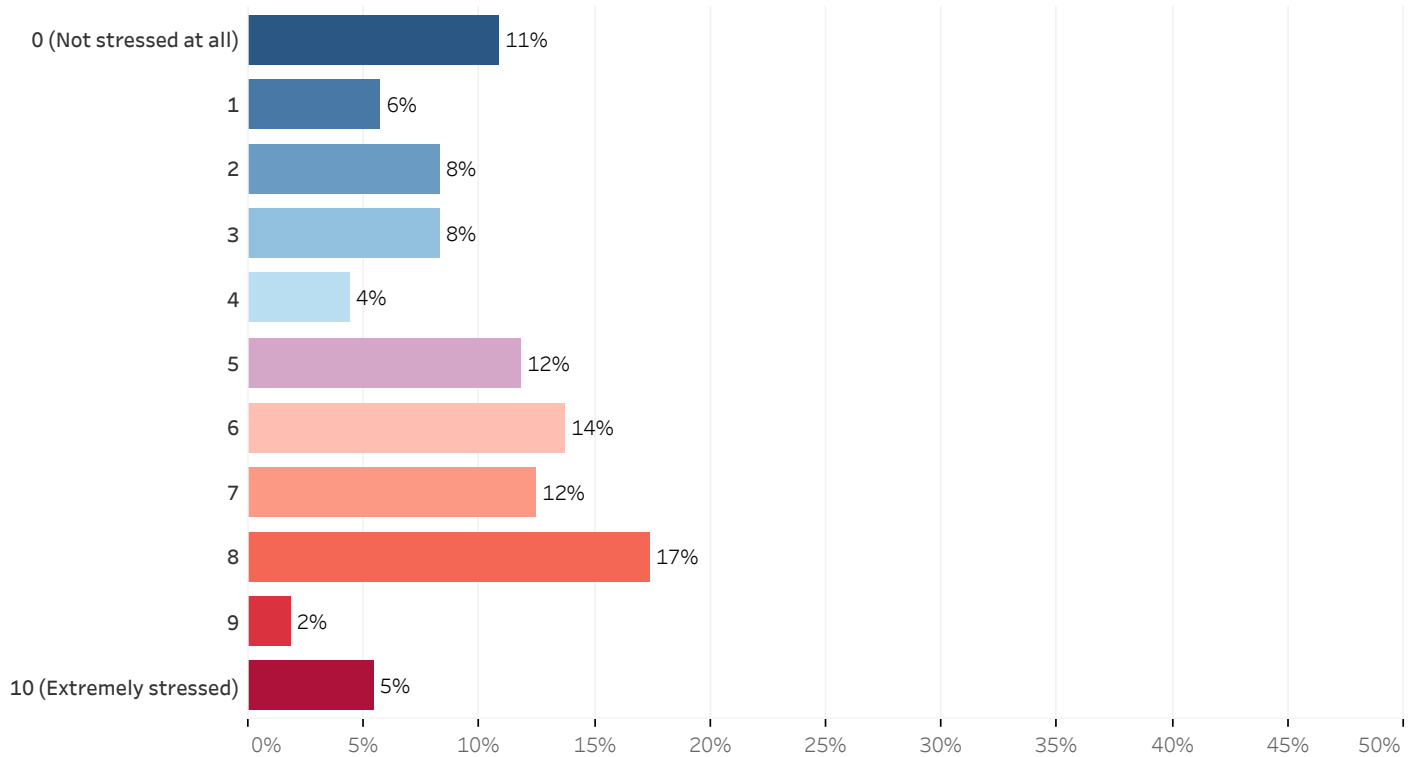
People in my community have a sense of connection to each other



Stress Level

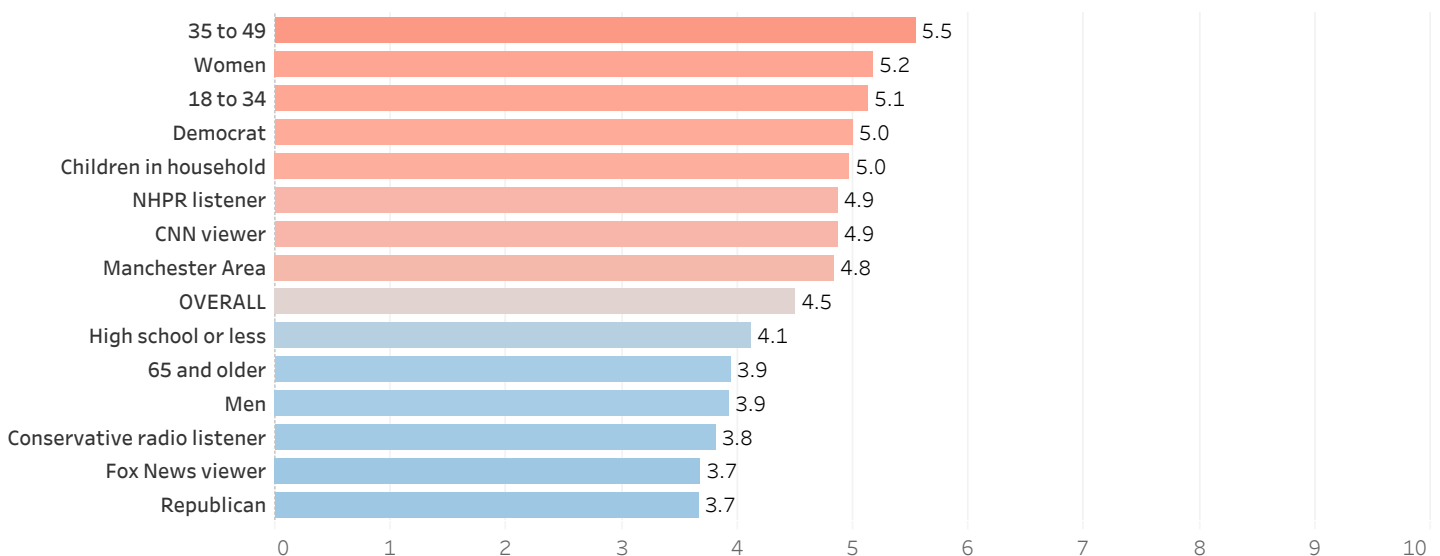
Three in eight (37%) New Hampshire residents indicate that in the past week they experienced high levels of stress (7-10 on a 0-10 scale). Thirty percent say they experienced middling stress (3-6 on a 0-10 scale) while one-third (33%) say they experienced low levels of stress (0-3).

Respondents aged 18 to 49, women, self-identified Democrats, those with children in their household, NHPR listeners, CNN viewers, and Manchester Area residents indicate that they have higher levels of stress than others. Self-identified Republicans, Fox News viewers, conservative radio listeners, men, those aged 65 and older, and those with a high school education or less indicate that they have lower levels of stress.

Technical Report

How the Sample Was Selected

The August 2022 Granite State Poll survey was a web-based survey of Granite State Panel members who are recruited from randomly-selected landline and cell phone numbers across New Hampshire. The Granite State Panel is part of an effort by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center to investigate new ways of gathering and understanding the opinion of New Hampshire residents. Respondents to the Granite State Poll were asked if they wished to participate in further research and asked to provide an email address. Those who agreed and provided an email address were added to the panel. Panel members were also recruited by texting a random sample of cellular telephones in the state and inviting the recipient to take a short survey. At the conclusion of the survey, recipients were asked if they would like to join the panel and provide an email address. Respondents under the age of 18, non-New Hampshire residents, and seasonal residents who are not registered to vote in New Hampshire were excluded from this survey and did not receive an invitation to join the panel. For each survey which they complete, panel members are entered into quarterly drawings to earn rewards, such as gift certificates from statewide and internet companies.

When Data Was Collected

An invitation email was sent to Granite State Panel members on August 25th, 2022. Two email reminders were sent to non-responders and the survey was completely closed on the morning of August 29th. Nine hundred and ninety-four (994) Granite State Panel members completed the survey. The response rate for the August 2022 Granite State Poll is 26%.

Weighting of Data

Data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, as well as party registration levels provided by the New Hampshire Secretary of State and to 2020 election results in New Hampshire. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.

Sampling Error

The Granite State Poll, like all surveys, is subject to sampling error due to the fact that all residents in the area were not interviewed. For those questions asked of five hundred (500) or so respondents, the error is +/-4.4%. For those questions where fewer than 500 persons responded, the sampling error can be calculated as follows:

$$\text{Sampling Error} = \pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{P(1 - P)}{N}}$$

Where P is the percentage of responses in the answer category being evaluated and N is the total number of persons answering the particular question.

For example, suppose you had the following distribution of answers to the question, "Should the state spend more money on road repair even if that means higher taxes?" Assume 1,000 respondents answered the question as follows:

YES	47%
NO	48%
DON'T KNOW	5%

The sampling error for the "YES" percentage of 47% would be

$$\pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{47(53)}{1000}} = \pm 3.1\%$$

for the "NO" percentage of 48% it would be

$$\pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{48(52)}{1000}} = \pm 3.1\%$$

and for the "DON'T KNOW" percentage of 5% it would be

$$\pm 1.96 \sqrt{\frac{5(95)}{1000}} = \pm 1.4\%$$

In this case we would expect the true population figures to be within the following ranges:

YES	43.9% - 50.1% (i.e., 47% ±3.1%)
NO	44.9% - 51.1% (i.e., 48% ±3.1%)
DON'T KNOW	3.6% - 6.4% (i.e., 5% ±1.4%)

The margin of sampling error for the August 2022 Granite State Poll is +/- 3.1 percent.

Design Effect

These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. The design effect for the survey is 2.9%.
